- Welcome Mitzi Downing, PLC Chair
   Mitzi led group introductions.
   October minutes reviewed and approved as presented.
   Agenda reviewed and approved as presented.
- 2. Update from AEA Albert Essel, Vonda Richardson
  - AEA officers for 2018-19 chair Carolyn Williams; chair elect Vonda Richardson; secretary Rosalind Dale; Mark Latimore Treasurer. These roles serve for these time periods: secretary (2 years); chair elect (2 years); chair (2 years); past chair (2 years).
  - The 1890 foundation has been established and is located at APLU. A
    roundtable was conducted earlier this month to talk about how the 1890 system
    (Extension, research, teaching) can collaborate across the system, and how to
    engage funding from both public and private sources. Among participants were
    representatives from World Bank, private foundations, and public foundations.
    Scott Angle, new NIFA director, participated for several hours also.



- At the APLU meeting in November, Dr. Jason DeKoff was awarded the Excellence in Extension award for the 1890 region.
- An 1890 Communications Summit was held with communications specialists from across the system. Participants met for two days to explore ways to document impacts and communicate/market programs that come from the 1890 region.
- On June 20-24, 2020, a system wide CES meeting is planned. In October, a planning committee convened to frame the meeting agenda. The meeting will be in Orlando at the Renaissance Hotel.
- Work is underway on an 1890 impact document that is planned to be released in January 2019.
  - There were no further questions.

## 3. Update from ASRED - Ron Brown, Randy Taylor

- Nick Place, UFL CES Director is the incoming chair of ASRED; Ed Jones, Tom Dobbins, and Gary Jackson are Southern Region ECOP representatives.
- Doug Steele, former Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Director, is now Vice-President for APLU's Food, Agriculture and Natural Resources division. He has the August PLN meeting on his calendar.
- The 1890/1862 system is discussing communications and marketing efforts working with K-Global.
- National Impacts Database, staffed by Texas AgriLife Extension, with a national advisory committee, has been revised significantly. Training will be provided soon to help people do a better job of writing impact reports and navigating the new system. The largest number of people that access these reports are people in DC.
- NIFA relocations The Secretary of Agriculture has announced plans to move NIFA outside of the DC area. The CES system has sent forward a letter to the Secretary outlining concerns.
- Budget line consolidation There has been a big push to reduce the number of NIFA lines (currently around 47 lines). However, this consolidation could have a negative impact on CES.
- The House version of the Farm Bill that is finished and was ready to be passed won't be passed. The new Congress elected last week will start over. The current version was very favorable for CES, particularly with the SNAP-Ed funding. Update: on 11/30/18, Dr. Brown reported that Congress has come to some general agreement on the Farm Bill, but the language on SNAP-Ed funding favored the Senate version rather than the House which provided stronger support for CES in this area.



• March 2019, a joint meeting of ASRED AEA, SAAESD, ARD, administrative heads, and CARET is planned with the meeting taking place in Florida.

## 8. Program Committee Reports

- ANR –Tom Melton and Kelli Hollins ANR met last month working on the Plan
  of Work. One item is working on heirs' property. Rachel mentioned SRDC's
  work in this and invited input. They plan to get with FCS and CRD to discuss
  further. Water quality is also a topic getting attention. Planning joint meeting
  with the North Central region. Discussed grant opportunities. Committee is
  interested in how to encourage 1890 participation.
- COM Lisa Stearns and ChaNae Bradley Committee is working with PSD on a marketing and communications curriculum. Identifying peer reviewers for the curriculum, adapting best practices for communicating Extension value, conducting Southern region 508 accessibility and privacy standards with IT committee. Response template for disaster communication.
- CRD –Mark Waller not met since this committee met last. CRD is continuing to work on a survey of CRD efforts. Several in CRD responded to the NIFA listening sessions
- FCS Leslie Speller-Henderson and Laura Stephenson Committees working on collaborative efforts on heirs' property, economic mobility with CRD, mapping project moving it forward - how can we take capacity mapping and overlay with the health concerns in our region. NIFA listening sessions FCS added comments. Food systems work continuing with SERA 47 and other related efforts. SNAP- Ed work has taken a lot of time to invest but has resulted in great conversations with 1862 and 1890 about collaboration to build capacity.
- 4-H Youth Dev Mitzi Downing and Manola Erby New STEM efforts are underway. National 4H Congress program is officially chartered which provides an avenue for obtaining funding. 750 youth attended this year's event, with numbers down a bit from the 1200-1500 attendance from past years. We would like to see more 1890 participation. 4H online 2.0 version as a system for managing the data for 4H enrollment working with Registration Max to tweak the process to be more responsive to the system's needs. We have traditionally counted events that total 6 hours or more in the region. Nationally, other states are reporting events of as low as one hour. This could impact funding. Common Measures 2.0 some Southern states looking at this process.



- IT Terrence Wolfork and Emily Tipton Discussed limited participation in the committee, especially with 1890. We are looking at grant opportunities to be more involved in multi-state grant. We have lost our repository at University of Arkansas for resources. Cumulative cyber security resources shared through the site. Accessibility, i.e. Rural broadband is also an interest.
- MM Gerald Jones and Lonnie Johnson, Jr. Finalized bi-annual conference in April 2019. University of Florida has taken a lead role in planning. Words of Wisdom tool for middle managers is on the PLN site. The next edition of the MM newsletter is coming out soon. Appreciation to the administrative advisors was noted: Dr. Cartwright and Dr. Williams.
- PSD –Celeste Allgood and Meredith Weinstein Cross committee competency based resources working with IT and Communications. Strategies for succession planning committee survey instrument to assess southern region succession planning efforts. The survey will be released in Feb. 2019. The virtual summer school is planned again for 2019.

### 9. Other Business

- Evaluation need to review the evaluation questions and tweak to fit this year's plans. Scott Cummings (TAMU) has conducted the evaluation over the past several years. Mark and Meredith will work with Scott on this year's evaluation.
- **Emily** will coordinate future calls on Zoom. Participants are encouraged to use cameras.
- How to encourage PLN participation?
  - o A matrix of participation by committee may help get a picture. Some institutions don't have someone in a particular role. Establish matrix that shows who is coming and for what, and to encourage a more active role for those involved. Vicki, Rachel and Russ to develop.
